In 1990 I was elected to the SAA Board. For the last 34 years I have been honored to be part of such a prestigious group of artists and to have the opportunity to contribute to the reputation and growth of SAA and animal art.

Once on the board, my initial effort was to raise the professional stature of the SAA by creating a more professional exhibition catalog. I also worked with the various presidents of the organization to come up with ways to use the catalogs to promote the organization - using them to help set up interviews, press releases and ultimately with David Wagner more museum partnerships. I produced our catalogs for the next 20-25 years. We created a pdf version as well. For the last 10 years of our catalog efforts I was able to get our printer to take on the enormous task of shipping & mailing copies to our membership. For many years we did an annual Art and the Animal exhibition poster as well.

As a Board member, one of the highlights was the Annual exhibition and Conference SAA held at Roger Tory Petersen Institute. I created an Awards program. I called up the major Art Print companies like MillPond and Greenwich and got them to donate \$35,000 for Cash Awards for our annual award winners... \$3500 for each Award of Excellence. I did this for 2 years.

Additionally, I worked with Dorcas MacClintock on our SAA in-house Newsletter for about 10 years. I did the layout and design and eliminated the mailing cost by creating it as a pdf.

As the new digital technologies began to evolve, I tried in numerous ways to create ways to make the Annual more accessible on a global scale. I created a believable realistic 3D exhibition online. We did that for 3-4 years.

I assisted with the partnership with the SKB Foundation and the 2016 Tex-Art workshop at Schreiner University, Kerrville, Texas, and with the (2019) "In the Audubon Tradition" Exhibition at the Cincinnati Museum of Natural History & Science. I created the inter active online exhibition for it as well as a special Educational Wikipedia link for every species.

As a result of the pandemic, I created an online professional exhibition format with additional enhanced features to hopefully assist our membership by having their website and social media sites included—hoping to actually create sales rather than just exhibit the artwork. The first of these was directed to our international members as I realized shipping costs might make it more difficult for them to participate. These were followed by Special Exhibitions for New Members and another dedicated to Birds. I also added a link to information about each species depicted in the artwork helping to fulfill our educational mission as well.
